

Routines and Expectations in Key Stage 1

Doors open at 8.40am and close at 8.45am

Correct uniform everyday

- No jewellery, except from watch and one pair of stud earrings
- Reading book and reading record to be in school everyday and taken home every evening.
- PE kit on PE days Wednesday and Friday
 - (If there are any changes to PE days, we will let you know via Class Dojo)
 - Children may come to school wearing correct PE kit on these days

Children are encouraged to become increasingly independent in KS1.

They will need to find their own coats, jumpers, book bags and remember to bring the right things to school and home again.





Reading in Year 1






Building on our phonics work from Reception


Developing **fluency** and **stamina** in our reading using our phonics knowledge and skills.

- Developing further comprehension skills.
- Reading and enjoying a range of books.











How are children assessed in Reading at the end of Year 1



- In Year 1, children's reading is assessed primarily through ongoing teacher assessments, focusing on both reading fluency and comprehension skills.
- In addition, all Year 1 children take part in the Phonics Screening Check in June. This is a government assessment where children are asked to read 40 words—some real and some pseudo (madeup) words designed to test their ability to decode using phonics. Children are considered to be working at the expected level if they meet the national pass mark, which is released by the government after the check has taken place.

We will send more information out about the Phonics Screening Check closer to the time.



Writing in Year 1

By the end of Year 1, we want our children to independently:


Write clear sentences using a capital letter at the front and the correct end mark.

Use their knowledge of phonics to make **good** attempts at spelling unknown words.

To spell common exception words correctly.

Form their letters using the correct size and orientation.

Maths in Year 1



By the end of Year 1, we want our children to

independently:

Count to and back from 100.

Read and write numbers to 100 in numerals.

Identify one **more and less** than a given number.

Recall number bonds to 20, including subtraction facts.


Add and subtract numbers to 20 and record these **using +, - and =** symbols.

Solve addition and subtraction problems using concrete objects and pictorial representations, including missing number problems.

Develop understanding of multiplication and division through grouping and sharing small quantities

Find half and quarter of shapes, objects and quantities.

How will teacher assessment be reported to parents?

- Once teacher assessments have been submitted, you will receive information on your child with their annual report.
- It is expected that the majority will be working at this standard, but some will be above or below.
- Children will be assessed as:
 - Working towards the expected standard;
 - Working at the expected standard;
 - Working at 'greater depth' within the expected standard.

How can parents help?



Please ensure your child reads as often as possible

Already had that book? Read and re-read to build pace and comprehension. Each book should be read at least 3 times.

Read 1 – concentrate on decoding.

Read 2 – to focus on fluency

Read 3 – focusing on comprehension

Write a comment in your child's reading record when they have read.

How can parents help?




One of the best ways to support your child's reading at home is by completing the **termly phonics challenges** we send out — **Bronze, Silver, and Gold**.

These challenges are designed to be **fun**, **motivating**, **and engaging**, while helping your child make steady progress towards the **Phonics Screening Check** in June.

Regular practice will build your child's confidence with sounding out and blending words – both real and pseudo – and help them develop strong reading habits.

Respectful


- We listen when others speak.

Fundamental British Values




The five Fundamental British Values are Democracy, the Rule of Law, Individual Liberty, Mutual Respect, and Tolerance of those with different faiths and beliefs.

These values were first set out by the government in the Prevent strategy in 2011 to promote social unity and are a responsibility of all schools and statemaintained institutions to "actively promote".



Protected Characteristics



Protected characteristics are personal attributes that are protected by law from discrimination and harassment, particularly under the UK's Equality Act 2010.

There are nine protected characteristics: Age, Disability, Gender reassignment, Marriage and civil partnership, Pregnancy and maternity, Race, Religion or belief, Sex, and Sexual orientation.
