English, Maths and Science



### Routines and Expectations in Key Stage 1

Doors open at 8.40am and close at 8.45am

### Correct uniform everyday

- No jewellery, except from watch and one pair of stud earrings
- Reading book and reading record to be in school everyday and taken home every evening.
- PE kit on PE days Monday and Tuesdays
  - (If there are any changes to PE days, we will let you know via Class Dojo)
  - Children may come to school wearing correct PE kit on these days

Children are encouraged to become increasingly independent in KS1.

They will need to find their own coats, jumpers, book bags and remember to bring the right things to school and home again.





### Reading in Year 2





- Building on our phonics work from Reception and Year 1.
- Developing fluency and stamina in our reading using our phonics knowledge and skills.
  - Developing further comprehension skills.
  - Reading and enjoying a range of books.





## <u>Assessment</u>



- Teacher assessment
- Reading termly reading and comprehension test and 1:1 reading with class teacher
- Writing evidence collected in books over the year.
- Maths regular pre and post assessments as well as a more formal Lingfield Education Trust termly assessment.
- Phonics if there are any children who did not pass their Phonics Check at the end of Year 1, they will be retested near the end of Year 2 in June.
- The Phonics Check will run the same as it did in Year 1.



## Writing in Year 2

By the end of Year 2, we want our children to independently:

Write simple, coherent pieces.

Form most lower case and capital letters with correct size, starting point, sequence of movement and orientation.

Spell most Year 1/2 common exception words correctly.

Spell most words correctly and make phonetically plausible attempts at others.



# By the end of Year 2, we want our children to independently:

Count to and back from 100, compare numbers to 100 and order numbers to 100...

Identify one **more and less** than a given number.

Read and write numbers to 100 in numerals.


Add and subtract any 2-digit numbers and record these using +, - and = symbols.

Solve addition and subtraction problems using concrete objects and pictorial representations, including missing number problems.

Know multiplication and division facts from the **2,5** and **10** times tables.

**Identify** 2D and 3D shapes post rotations.

# How will teacher assessment be reported to parents?

- Once teacher assessments have been submitted, you will receive information on your child with their annual report.
- It is expected that the majority will be working at this standard, but some will be above or below.
- Children will be assessed as:
  - Working towards the expected standard;

  - Working at 'greater depth' within the expected standard.

# How can parents help?



### Reading

Children will be sent home with a reading book and their reading record every day.

Ensure that your child is reading regularly: ideally every night, but <u>at least 3</u> times a week for at least 20 minutes.


Read 1 – concentrate on decoding.

Read 2 – to focus on fluency

Read 3 – focusing on comprehension

Write a comment in your child's reading record when they have read.

Already had that book?
Read and re-read to build pace and comprehension.

### Respectful


- We listen when others speak.

### Class Dojo Schoolwide System

- In Y1-6, all teachers use Class Dojo
- Dojos are given out for meeting the behaviour expectations and living by the school's virtues.
- Teachers can communicate with parents here and will regularly post about events happening in and outside of the classroom.
- Parents may communicate with teacher here – teacher will reply as quickly as they can.



### **Virtues**





School virtues are positive character traits and moral values taught and promoted by our school to foster character development, support student well-being, and create a positive learning environment.

### Fundamental British Values




The five Fundamental British Values are Democracy, the Rule of Law, Individual Liberty, Mutual Respect, and Tolerance of those with different faiths and beliefs.

These values were first set out by the government in the Prevent strategy in 2011 to promote social unity and are a responsibility of all schools and statemaintained institutions to "actively promote".



### **Protected Characteristics**



Protected characteristics are personal attributes that are protected by law from discrimination and harassment, particularly under the UK's Equality Act 2010.

There are nine protected characteristics: Age, Disability, Gender reassignment, Marriage and civil partnership, Pregnancy and maternity, Race, Religion or belief, Sex, and Sexual orientation.
